





In a Kenya where harmful stories often silence hope, Maskani Ya Taifa (MYT) steps in as a game-changer. It's more than a program, it's a movement empowering citizens to own their stories, shape public conversations, and actively participate in governance.

In 2024, MYT became the pulse of civic action, uniting communities both on the ground and online to rewrite the nation's story. From vibrant county hubs like #MaskaniKwale, #MaskaniMombasa, and #MaskaniEldoret, where citizens identified and addressed local issues, to powerful online campaigns such as

#HealthcareCrisis, which trended at number one nationally, #FloodsKE, #ProtectOurConstitution, and #WomenLivesMatterKE, MYT proved that when citizens lead, meaningful change follows.

These hubs weren't just places to meet, they were spaces of learning, planning, and action, where communities took charge of their futures. Meanwhile, MYT's digital presence exploded, turning hashtags into real movements. Citizens joined Twitter Spaces like the Finance Bill 2024 discussion, breaking down complex policies and sparking public action.

By collaborating with CSOs, coalitions, and advocacy networks, MYT transformed trending campaigns into impactful advocacy. Through innovative civic tech, MYT amplified citizen voices, demanding transparency and accountability at every level.

MYT isn't just a program, it's a movement. From county halls to trending hashtags, every conversation and action contributed to a stronger, more accountable Kenya.

Maskani Ya Taifa: One hub, one click, one change at a time

#MaskaniMombasa: Empowering Change Through Dialogue

On March 10, 2024, **#MaskaniMombasa** brought together 20 participants, most under 35, to tackle the pressing issues of substance abuse, addiction, and mental health in their community. The conversation was a powerful call to action, emphasizing the need for education, mental health services, and community support to steer individuals toward healthier choices.

Participants highlighted the importance of awareness campaigns to combat drug abuse and enhance mental health literacy, especially among the youth. Proposed solutions included establishing more rehabilitation centers, launching prevention initiatives, and advocating to destigmatize mental health. Collaborative efforts among stakeholders were seen as crucial to building a resilient, supportive community.

Building a Safer, Stronger Tiwi: Community Action in 2024

This year, **#MaskaniKwale** spearheaded transformative conversations in Tiwi, Kwale County, tackling key issues head-on. From bolstering community policing through neighbourhood watch programs to addressing the growing concerns around gender-based violence, the message was clear: safety is a shared responsibility. Citizens demanded accountability and transparency from duty-bearers, calling for decisive action to restore trust and peace.

Through community forums and advocacy campaigns, Tiwi residents showed the power of collective action —proving that when people come together, a safer, stronger future is within reach.

#MaskaniEldoret

In 2024, **#MaskaniEldoret** became a vibrant platform for tackling pressing issues in democracy and **g**overnance. Youth leadership took center stage, with discussions revealing critical gaps in representation and a call for more inclusive decision-making. Participants didn't hold back—job scandals were laid bare, sparking demands for transparency and accountability in hiring processes.

Debates on Eldoret's potential city status highlighted the need for inclusive development strategies, with a strong focus on public participation. From improving health, education, and SRHR services to upgrading infrastructure like roads, drainage, and sewer systems, the message was clear: sustainable development starts with good governance.

The **Wellness Resilience Resource Hub** is a sanctuary dedicated to supporting civic actors in Kenya, Tanzania, and Uganda. Designed for public interest advocates and their families, the Hub offers spaces for rest, reflection, healing, and growth. Facilitated by Inuka Kenya Ni Sisi!, Uganda National NGO Forum, and Tanzania's Legal and Human Rights Centre, it fosters resilience and well-being for those advancing civil society.

Throughout the year, the Wellness Resilience Resource Hub has been a cornerstone of psychological support for individuals and organizations across Kenya, Uganda, and Tanzania. In May, we hosted several wellness clinics,

addressing various mental health topics thoughtfully tailored to audience requests. These sessions provided guidance and a sense of community for many grappling with emotional challenges.

We stood alongside journalists covering the harrowing Shakahola stories and the gravediggers who bore the weight of uncovering mass graves. Their resilience inspired us to ensure they had the mental support needed to process such traumatic experiences.

Your Wellbeing is our priority

During the #RejectFinanceBill protests, we extended a hand to young people who took to the streets, offering support before, during, and after their courageous stand. We provide psychological support to frontline responders who were at the forefront of assisting victims during flooding, protests, and the retrieval of bodies in Kware. Their dedication and resilience inspired us to ensure they had the mental and emotional resources needed to navigate these challenging circumstances.

Throughout the year, we conducted mental awareness training for various organizations, including Crime Si Poa, Feminist for peace Right and Justice centre as well as members of Maskani Hub. These sessions were held across

multiple counties in Kenya, aiming to empower participants with practical tools to enhance emotional well-being, manage stress, and build resilience. By engaging diverse groups, we fostered a broader understanding of mental health and its importance in personal and community development.

In addition to in-person sessions, we've actively shared mental health resources on our online platforms, including the East Africa Wellness Resource Hub and our website. These digital efforts have extended the reach of our work, ensuring that vital information and support are accessible to a wider

audience across the region. By combining hands-on training with online resource sharing, we have fostered a comprehensive approach to mental health awareness and support.

Our work has also reached social justice centres and countless civic actors, reinforcing the spirit of resilience within the civic ecosystem. As 2024 draws to a close, we are reminded of the vital role we play in supporting those who dedicate their lives to the public good. Together, we continue to heal, reflect, and grow stronger.

Tulia Wellness Space in Uganda

Our wellness partners Uganda National NGO Forum established the Tulia Wellness Space, a haven dedicated to supporting civic actors and partners. This initiative provides therapy sessions tailored to address the mental and emotional challenges of their demanding roles. The Tulia Wellness Space reflects a commitment to fostering resilience and well-being within the civil society sector, promoting a healthier and more effective environment for impactful work.



But in the quiet moments between the chaos, we felt it too, the exhaustion, the strain, the emotional bruises no one could see. A repose was calling. With the unwavering support of Civil Rights Defenders, our wellness program turned a long-overdue page: it was time to care for the caregivers.

Prioritizing Mental Health: Building Resilient Communities

In a hall bathed in sunlight and alive with the vibrant hum of conversation, changemakers from Kenya, Uganda, and Tanzania came together for a mission that could reshape the future of mental health in civic spaces. Hosted by Inuka Kenya Ni Sisi!, this wasn't just another training—it was a powerful rallying cry. A call for civic actors and human rights defenders to reclaim their well-being in a world that often pushes them to the brink. The training challenged them to unlearn harmful stereotypes, reflect on their well-being, and embrace WHO's vision of mental health as a state of resilience, productivity, and meaningful contribution to the community.



Through this curriculum, a powerful message was clear: prioritizing mental health is not just beneficial, it's essential for building strong, sustainable civic spaces and resilient communities across East Africa.



Rooted in the belief that a progressive civic sphere is the heartbeat of meaningful change, this initiative is more than a movement—it's a call to action. Kesho mobilizes progressive Kenyans to envision and build a society that values dignity, integrity, and hard-earned success.

At the heart of this transformation is **The Elephant**, a dynamic platform that challenges narratives, interrogates history, and reimagines the future. Together with Uongozi Lab and strategic community outreach, Kesho fosters deep, reflective conversations, both online and on the ground, empowering citizens to reclaim their voice and reshape their public sphere.

The Elephant

In 2024, <u>*The Elephant*</u> continued to redefine how Kenyans and the wider African community engage with social, political, and cultural issues. Rooted in Pan-African ideals, the platform amplified marginalized voices and championed dignity and inclusivity. It became a powerful space for dialogue, communitybuilding, and truth-seeking, boldly challenging inequalities while reimagining a more just society.

Through its partnerships with organizations like the Ford Foundation, The Elephant published 209 pieces of content, including investigative articles, podcasts, videos, and photostories. These stories touched on pressing topics, such as the Gen Z protests and the Affordable Housing Act, offering fresh perspectives and sparking critical conversations. With over 610,000 views and 261,000 unique visitors, The Elephant's audience grew steadily, drawing readers from across Kenya and beyond, including the USA, Germany, and Ethiopia.

The platform's social media presence was equally impactful, with over 5,000 monthly interactions on Twitter/X alone, extending its reach to an estimated 8.5 million people. By amplifying youth-led movements like the Gen Z protests, The Elephant showcased the power of young people in driving civic change and inspired broader engagement in governance and social justice.

Movement Building

Weaving Resilience Convening

In April 2024, 73 passionate individuals from over 30 organizations and hubs across the Global South gathered in Rio de Janeiro for the Weaving Resilience event. The gathering brought together a vibrant community of change-makers, activists, and leaders, all focused on strengthening resilience, enhancing wellness, and building a collective global network.

Among the attendees were Dr. Kawive Wambua, our CEO, and Salima Macharia, our Wellness Officer, who represented Inuka Kenya Ni Sisi! from the East African region. They joined the meeting to exchange ideas and learn from others in the pursuit of building stronger, more resilient organizations in challenging times.

Weaving Resilience for Human Rights in East Africa

On March 16, 2023, 20 human rights defenders (HRDs) from 16 organizations gathered in Zanzibar for an inspiring retreat under the Weaving Resilience Initiative, led by DefendDefenders and supported by the Ford Foundation. The two-day event brought together four key hubs—HRD Protection, Digital Resilience, Wellness, and Financial Resilience—to foster collaboration and innovative solutions for the challenges HRDs face across East Africa. From cross-border protection efforts shared by the HRD Protection Hub to digital safety strategies from KICTAnet and CIPESA, and holistic care from INUKA Ni Sisi!, the retreat addressed vital issues, including wellness integration, digital threats, and long-term sustainability.

The retreat culminated in joint action plans, strengthening networks, and a renewed commitment to creating a safer, more resilient environment for HRDs in East Africa. The Weaving Resilience Initiative is not just a partnership—it's a movement redefining human rights advocacy in the region, igniting hope and inspiring bold action for the future. This is only the beginning of a transformative journey.

Inuka Kenya Joins Twaweza East Africa for Health Report Launch

On June 6th, Inuka Kenya partnered with **Twaweza East Africa** to unveil a timely health sector report titled Shifting to SHIF: Time for a health check ahead of the launch of the Social Health Insurance Fund (SHIF) in July. The findings paint a vivid picture of citizens' current struggles with healthcare services, from frustrations with NHIF coverage to the debate between public and private care.

As SHIF promises to widen access to critical health services, the report's insights underscore the need for reforms that truly listen to the people. Inuka Kenya Ni Sisi! stands ready to amplify these voices as the country gears up for this pivotal shift.

Empowering Citizens for Regional Integration: Insights from the East African Civil Society Summit 2024

In June 2024, over 300 changemakers, including representatives from East African CSOs, government officials, academics, and development partners, gathered at Mt. Meru Hotel, Arusha, Tanzania, for the East African Civil Society Summit. Themed "Harnessing Citizens' Potential in Regional Integration Processes," the summit spotlighted how technology can combat climate change and bolster regional food security.

Inuka Kenya Ni Sisi! made a significant impact by delivering a keynote on "Civic Space: CSO Resilience in the Region." The presentation sparked dynamic conversations about a proposed Regional CSO Bill, challenges in donor funding, and how national lessons could inform regional civic engagement. Additionally, findings from a study on Civil Society Resilience provided actionable insights into fostering CSO sustainability.

Looking ahead, Inuka Kenya Ni Sisi! is poised to join the East African Civil Society Organisations Forum (EACSOF) through the Kenyan Chapter—a strategic step to strengthen regional networks for movement-building and wellness advocacy across East Africa.

The People's Anti-Corruption Summit

On 8th July, changemakers united at The People's Anti-Corruption Summit to champion whistleblower protection as a critical tool in combating corruption. Under the theme, "Effective Whistleblower Protection Mechanism: A Critical Tool in the Fight Against Corruption," the summit spotlighted the courage of whistleblowers and called for stronger safeguards to protect them. Engaging discussions unpacked systemic challenges fueling corruption, explored policy gaps, and identified solutions to fortify institutions and promote accountability. The summit was a powerful reminder that the fight against corruption demands collective action, unwavering support for truthtellers, and a united commitment to eliminating impunity in society.

Debt and Corruption Citizen Assembly

In August 2024, Inuka Kenya Ni Sisi! joined forces with Okoa Uchumi partners to address Kenya's debt crisis and entrenched corruption through the Debt & Anti-Corruption Citizen Assembly. This powerful coalition sought to challenge the status quo and advocate for fiscal justice and accountability, emphasizing that debt and corruption are not just economic challenges but existential threats to the nation. Stories from everyday Kenyans—businesses burdened by unfair taxes, families denied healthcare, and communities suffering from neglected infrastructure—highlighted the urgent need for change. The assembly called for empowering citizens, enhancing financial accountability, and driving grassroots-led reforms to demand integrity and transparency at every level. This movement envisions a future where public resources serve the people, not the corrupt few.

Civic Voice Initiative

Through impactful activities such as youth leadership training, policy dialogues, and targeted advocacy campaigns, Civic Voice has empowered young people to reclaim their agency and actively participate in shaping their democratic future. This year alone, several insightful reports have highlighted the strides made in increasing youth representation and amplifying their voices in key decision-making spaces. Standing Up for Civic Rights: Voices at the 4th Annual Civic Space Protection Summit

Inuka Kenya, alongside other civil society organizations, participated in the 4th Annual Civic Space Protection Summit in Mombasa on September 18-19, 2024. The summit focused on the shrinking civic space in Kenya, highlighting threats to constitutional rights and freedoms. Key concerns included the government's disregard for court orders, such as the defiance by former acting Inspector-General of Police, Gilbert Masengeli, and the erosion of judicial oversight. The summit also condemned police violence during peaceful protests, exemplified by the case of Trever Mathenge, a student injured by police, and voiced opposition to the Assemblies and Demonstrations Bill of 2024.

Digital activism and freedom of expression emerged as central issues, with concerns over state surveillance and online harassment forcing many activists into self-censorship. The summit concluded with a powerful call for resilience and unity, urging civil society to stand firm in the fight for justice and democracy, even in the face of increasing dangers, including the loss of over 60 activists in recent years.
